# Administrator's Report 02/12/24

Well #15 is now on line and operational. So far it looks to be one of our best producers as we continue to evaluate. Our Public Works staff should be recognized for bringing this project in approximately 40% under what the original estimates and budget had called for. We believe to date we have encumbered \$477,000 in expenses with a few outstanding invoices remaining but no where near the \$800,000 in the original estimate.

**Spring sports** will be starting up in March. Parks staff are busy preparing the concession stands and also work on several fields is well under way. If anyone knows of someone who is looking for a part time position this spring and would want to work in the concessions please contact Erin Turner.

Work continues to complete the **dog park in the old fenced soccer area**. The Frisbee golf course has seen a good amount of play already but the hole markers should be in place in the next week. The next big event in King Jack Park will be the Easter egg hunt to be held on March 23<sup>rd</sup>.

It has been awhile but three of the **four fountains are now operational in the ponds** at King Jack Park. Recent rains have added enough water to turn them back on and it does appear that our recent work in the rock area may have slowed the leaks.

**The Street Department is out making patches to pot holes** this week. If you are aware of any places that need additional attention please let us know. We are also in the process of evaluating the streets for next years overlay. Please pass along any locations you would like looked at.

**City staff have been working with the Joplin Trails Coalition** to complete an extension of the Frisco Trail north from Stadium drive, east of Madison to travel north through the Cardinal Valley Habitat property and then extend over to Madison. This is considered Phase one of a JTC plan to connect the Frisco Trail to the Ruby Jack Trail north of Oronogo. This project will be presented to council on Monday for consideration and possible approval.

Please take note at the end of this report for the **Community Development list of upcoming 2024 Events.** We had a great year last year and are looking forward to an even better next year!

## **Previous Meetings**

**The annual "State of the City"** event was held at noon on Thursday at Granny Shafer's restraint on Madison. The event is sponsored each year by the Webb City Chamber of Commerce to give area citizens the highlights of the past year here in Webb City and also to point to plans for future growth. Items focused on growth in the retail and business community, the work that the council has authorized within the city such as utility expansions and street improvements. Chief Don Melton also offered his insight to changes and happenings within the Public Safety and Emergency Management fields.

**The recent storm** was not as bad with the snow and wind as was first reported possible but our crews were out Monday morning at 5am spreading probably more sand than salt because when the temperatures fall well below zero Rick advised salt will not work as well as sand. City staff operated on a 10am delayed start on Monday giving our crews some time to clear the streets.

It is that time of year again. Our public works crews **have faced three water main breaks** recently and as this cold weather begins to subside we are sure there will be additional issues come up. The response and repair time of our crews has been impressive to say the least. They have had the mains effected back up and running in a couple hours on each. We continue to ask that anyone who finds water in locations it is not supposed to be to please report it so we can make sure it is not a leak.

### Webb City Employees stepping up during the Holiday Season.

Last month we presented to one of our own Fire Department personnel who has a family member suffering from illness with \$2,406.00 in cash from this year's Badges & Burger's fundraiser. The Fire Department Local Firefighters Union also will have an additional \$480 to donate to the worthy cause. There was an additional \$1,000 retained for future emergencies within our personnel family.

The Webb City Police Department has been raising money through an extended version of No Shave November that was approved by Chief Melton. Last month the Webb City Senior center was presented a check in the amount of \$3,500 by the members of the Police Department at a luncheon held at the center.

Parks Department has been working to get the **heat exchanger repaired on the kitchen at the Farmers Market**. It apparently quit over the Holiday Weekend. Estimates have been received in the area of \$4,500 and the repairs have been ordered on an emergency basis. City staff continue to meet with Farmers Market staff each month to identify some areas of assistance that the city can do to make the operation continue to be a success.

# Progress continues along Madison Avenue on the new Popeyes and What A Burger

locations. Popeyes has informed city staff that they plan to be open by the end of February and we anticipate not long after that What A Burger will soon open. Continued growth appears good so far as we look into 2024. The new Tee Time location is moving along with plans to open in

early spring and we are working with two other local and national chains who are planning expansions here in Webb City in the retail food market.

After a recent traffic accident on **North Homestead Road** city staff will be looking to see if there are some reasonable improvements that can be made to improve the safety of the corner. The corner currently has sufficient approach signage but we are looking at possible flashing lights as one approaches the corner and maybe some additional markings within the curve.

Staff have been working with engineers to seek possible funding for an additional water storage tank to be utilized possibly in the northwest part of the city. Staff will be bringing forward any progress as it becomes available.

**City staff have met with the owners of the property directly behind Flat Creek Grill and Sleep Inn**. It is their desire to begin a commercial project on the land and have requested input from the city as to what we feel would fit best. Several options were discussed and an agreement was made with all to do our best to promote that site as any opportunities present themselves. We look forward to working with them **to spur further commercial ventures within Centennial Retail Park**.

We have now been able to fill the part time position at the recycle gate so the gate is now scheduled to be open 7 days a week from 9am to 6pm.

**Staff have been working with EPA and Cardinal Valley Habitat Trustees to fund a large concrete pad** to be utilized in our bio-solid composting program. Currently we use the gravel area north of the plant to lay out our rows for composting and drying. A concrete pad would reduce wear and tear on our equipment and reduce any water seepage that occurs during the process. We have received word that this project has been approved for funding and we should be contacted in the near future with further details. This will be something we have been working on for many years and are excited to see it become even a possibility.

# AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF WEBB CITY, MISSOURI TO ISSUE A SPECIAL TAX ASSESSMENT ON CERTAIN PARCELS OF REAL ESTATE ARISING OUT OF EXPENSES INCURRED BY THE CITY THROUGH SUMMARY ABATEMENT OF PUBLIC NUISANCES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEBB CITY, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** Pursuant to Webb City Code Section 220.010 (D) (4), Section 220.010 (D) (5), 220.010 (D) (6), and 220.130, (F), the City hereby assesses, against the tracts of real estate described on Schedule A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth herein, the amounts set forth in Schedule A as special tax bills to recover the costs and expenses incurred by the City in the summary abatement of public nuisances existing on each such tract of real estate.

**<u>SECTION 2</u>** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its date of passage.

# **SUBJECT:**

To allow remaining ARPA funds to be used to reimburse ARPA allowable governmental expenditures

### **BACKGROUND:**

Staff has discussed the advantages of reimbursing governmental funds (General, Public Works (Streets) for allowable ARPA expenditures from ARPA funds for fiscal years 2022-2023 and 2023-2024. A few of the benefits are:

- 1. Using an Alternative Approach audit instead of a full Single Audit. Compliance requirements are 2 instead of 6. Time and money would be saved.
- 2. No time contraints on spending the funds. A new ruling states that all ARPA funds be under contract by December 31,2024 and not just obligated/budgeted.
- 3. Future expenditures won't have compliance restrictions. By allowing funds to be reimbursed for allowable expenditures it frees up funds to use for any governmental expenditures.
- 4. Eliminating future ARPA reporting.

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff is seeking approval of council to allow reimbursement of government funds for allowable ARPA expenditures.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Governmental cash account(s) will increase and the ARPA fund will decrease resulting in a net effect of \$0.

Motion to support Joplin Trails Coalition to expand Frisco Trail from Stadium Drive to North Madison on Habitat Property

#### Description

The Joplin Trails Coalition has requested Webb City support for a proposed expansion of the Frisco Trail north from Stadium Drive through the Cardinal Valley Habitat property ending on north Madison south of Center Creek. This is considered Phase 1 of the goal to connect the Frisco Trail to the Ruby Jack Trail north of Oronogo.

#### Narrative

Joplin Trails Coalition along with staff from Webb City will be making application for a Department of Natural Resources grant for approximately \$200,000 that will have a match of 20% but that funding will come 100% from the JTC. The City of Webb City Habitat program will be responsible for initial dirt work that can be performed by Habitat staff and equipment and then yearly maintenance as needed. For location of trail please see attached map.


